The NSW Higher School Certificate Drama course launched in 1992 and was first examined in 1993. As the course was new and teachers and students desperate for examples of exemplary work, OnSTAGE came into being in 1995 at the Wharf 2 Theatre at the Sydney Theatre Company. The following year it found its home at the Seymour Centre and has run every year there since (except for one year when only a digital package was available during our COVID lockdowns).

2023 celebrates the 29th year of OnSTAGE and we can be very proud of the standard we have produced in our course and our students.

A big part of our success is the ability to showcase some of the best works from across the state in group performance and individual projects. I often hear from teachers that OnSTAGE is the annual excursion highlight for their students and themselves. It opens up a world of possibilities to all the different approaches you can take to succeed in the HSC Drama course. There is a plethora of genres, group compositions, staging, creative choices, voices and ideas that emerge that allow students agency to explore the world around them in our unique and important art form.

I'd also like to pay homage to the production managers who pioneered OnSTAGE from its inception: Wendy Michaels in 1995, followed by Paul Viles from 1996–2015. 
